Covenant

Approvals:

Laurel moved and Jud seconded that the January minutes be approved. Unanimous approval, motion passed.

Building and grounds FY '24 budget – Laurel

- Not very different from last year
- 6% raise for maintenance staff
- Restored the painting line that had been deleted for the current year
- Increases in utilities costs
- Workman's comp increased it is a political construct and was depleted during Covid; needs to be replenished

 \cdot Major maintenance – will depend upon what is decided for projects such as the stairway into the basement.

Discussion of the estimate for putting in basement entrance (\$476,000, plus costs of additional toilets, heating, etc.). Will need to be sent to BOT for discussion.

There is currently \$130,000 in the building fund; will be about \$144,000 at the end of the fiscal year.

Wayne moved to approve the FY'24 buildings and grounds budget; Jud seconded; unanimous approval, motion passed.

B & G issues – Laurel

· Solar proposals – Bob Persons

• Reviewed the proposals from the 621 Energy company that had been sent out with the agenda

 $_{\odot}$ 621 Energy has already done a number of solar installations, including churches with historic preservation requirements and has obtained wavers for those.

• The best way to do this project is for FUUSN to buy the system outright at a cost of about \$141,000 – however, FUUSN would receive an incentive payment,

as well as a payment (Direct Pay) from the Inflation Reduction Act that would decrease the cost by 30%

• Payback period - after 6 years, FUUSN would be making money

• Laurel – FUUSN will have to take down part of the old slate roof and replace it with asphalt at a cost of approximately \$50-60,000.

• The rubber flat roof is sound but the seams are leaking; it will be more difficult to maintain with the solar panels in place.

• The solar panels would be at a very low tilt angle and would be weighed down to avoid blowing off, rather than being fixed to the roof.

• There was a question about an estimate for building floating panels over what would be a new parking lot. This cost would be about double that for a roof system. However, a canopy system would also generate more electricity. Payback time would also double.

• Long discussion about options, costs, and payback time

• Bob Persons will get updated estimates and an estimate for canopied panels and send to Susan

Staff Update

Parisa – they are all doing well as a team, just in time for Anne's sabbatical.

Good attendance at FUUSN history sessions. There were some technical glitches in recording the information but they are working on it

 \cdot They are interested in setting up another session, especially for families with children who could not attend other sessions.

• Have received good suggestions from the congregation about the minister's portraits

What remains is a way for the congregation to come together when there is conflict

away; Parisa will discuss with Anne.

Devin

Feb. 11- they had a trip to Temple Reyim with 6° and 7° graders; they will be organizing a reverse visit soon

• Feb. 12 – about 26 youth and mentors prepared lasagnas for the homeless. On February 15, served about 90 people

March theme is belonging – continuing their discussion of how to give back to FUUSN. Spirit circles will offer the chance for adult/Ops Council participation (How to give time, talent, treasure)

• Will likely be having other congregations (children) participate in OWL next year; working on fee structure options

BOT January meeting – Eric

Discussion of the establishment of the search committee for the new minister

Discussion of possible future staff structure; Parisa is working on this – will need this information for the budget

Long discussion about social action committee although no conclusions

• Chris – congregation survey will be sent out in March; hopefully will be completed in about 4 weeks. Looking for input about people whom the congregation would like to see on the search committee, among other things.

Financial – Karen

January expenditures – nothing surprising on income side; pledges coming in on schedule; services auction made at least \$15,000 (rough figure).

Expenses – everything in line; utilities may come in a bit less, workman's comp more. \$26,000 in the black through January.

Susan talked to Dan Stoll today; the budget drive kicks off on March 5. The budget team would like the Ops Council and BOT members to pledge by March 3 so that they can announce "they already have \$xxx" pledged on March 5.

FUUSN Covid Protocols – consensus is that no changes are required.

Update: Committee activities

• There will be a committee chairs meeting on March 18. Susan is looking for agenda items, and several were proposed. Susan will find out an available time and room and notify everyone
